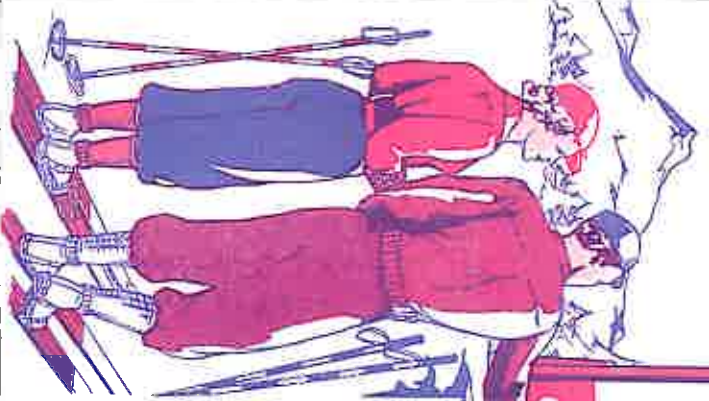

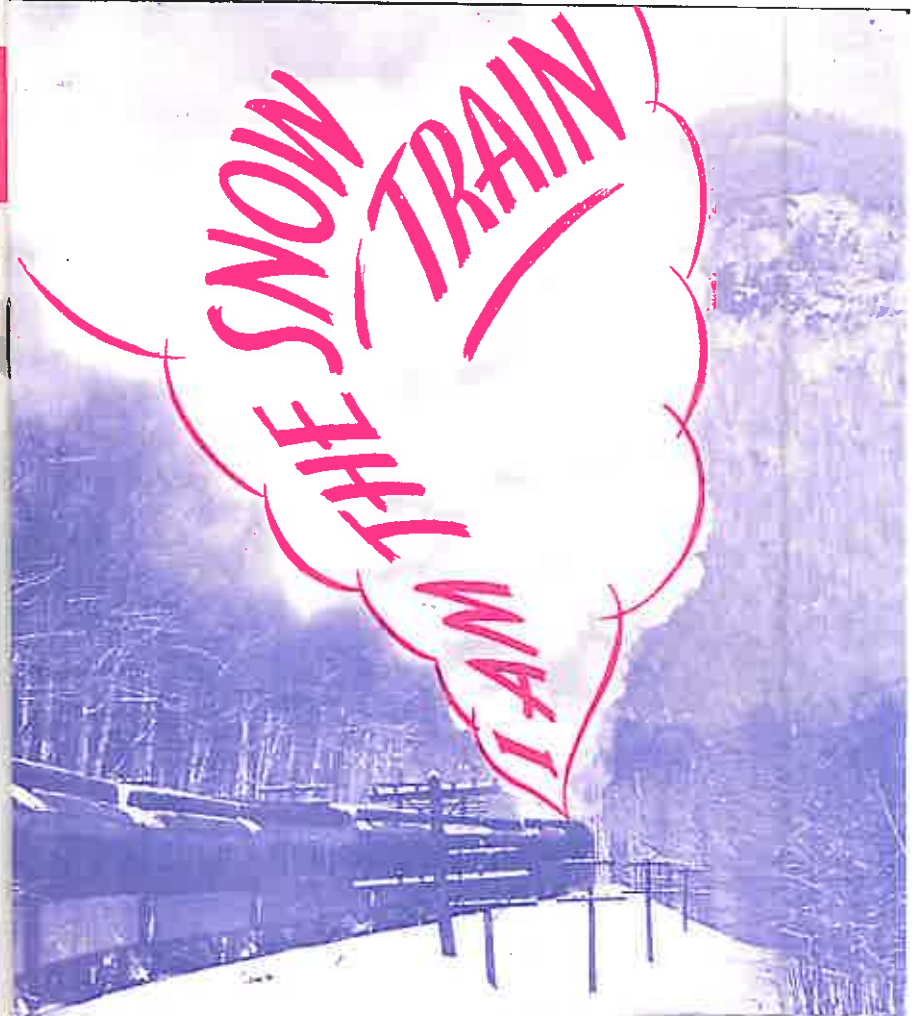

THIS booklet, published by the Boston and Maine Railroad, in cooperation with the hotels, inns, winter sports supply dealers and others in Northern New England, was once the primer for the prospective skier, and other winter sports enthusiast.

Winter sports in Northern New England have now progressed so that, we believe, there is no longer a need for informative matter as to "What is this 'Snow Train'", or "How Can I Find Fun in Skiing or other Winter Sports".

Almost anyone can find some friend—and more often dozens of friends—who will gladly give first-hand information of how they have fun on the "Snow Train". Almost any large department store, sporting goods establishment, and specialty shop today has a winter sports expert in attendance to give advice and help in choosing the proper equipment and the proper clothing necessary to get the utmost in enjoyment and health-giving red-blooded exercise out of winter sports.

The "Snow Train Booklet", therefore, graduates, as has its pupils from the primer class for the uninitiated to what it has really become, the official manual for the winter sports enthusiast on "Where to Go", "How To Go", "Where to Stay on Week Ends" and "Where is the best place to buy, or add to, equipment".

When the Boston and Maine originated the country's first "Snow Train", nine years ago, Sunday was "the day" for winter sports.

Now, EVERY day is Fun Day during the winter in Northern New England. The Boston and Maine, fully cognizant of this fact, lists in this season's "Snow Train" booklet four separate types of very low fares for Winter Sports enthusiasts. Fares are priced so very low that, as the veteran winter sports fan well knows, "it is silly to go any other way but by train".

By train you travel in warm comfort. You have no traffic worries. You get there faster, have more time to spend out of doors and no after-dark driving homeward on icy or storm-swept roads. You have fun, with safety, enroute. You can laugh at the sudden sleet storms, the unexpected blizzards, the dangerous icy roads, as you ride in warm comfort with the Boston and Maine engineer at your

chauffeur. You are sorry for those folks who pay for frozen radiators; who can't get home because an unexpected sleet or snow storm has made roads extremely dangerous or impassable.

The four-type fares which the Boston and Maine offers this winter are as follows:

The original "Snow Train" Sunday one-day trips from the North Station in Boston with the round trip fares ranging from \$1.75 to \$2.75, depending on the distance it is necessary for the "Snow Train" to travel in order to take you to where snow conditions are best.

The regular, every-week "Week End Snow Trains", which enable you to leave Boston Saturday, move quickly to any one of a dozen or more Winter Sports Centers, and return late Sunday afternoon or evening.

The special "Holiday Week End Snow Trains" which, with special low fares, leave Boston on Fridays (or the day preceding a holiday) and give you two to three days to spend in the "North Country" having fun.

The "Every Day Fares" for winter sports enthusiasts, which permit you to travel anywhere on the Boston and Maine at 2 cents a mile for the round trip, with three full calendar days allowed for the trip. Then there are the low every day round trip fares, priced just a trifle higher than the three-day round trip, which are good for the entire season, going any day and returning any day.

You will find typical fares for all four types of low, bargain-priced tickets for winter sport enthusiasts, listed on the pages of the "Snow Train Booklet". You will find an index on the inside front cover. In the rear of the booklet you will find listed the leading hotels, inns and boarding places which cater especially to winter sports enthusiasts and who have learned how, through eight years of experience, to take especially good care of winter sports enthusiasts and to make sure that they have a good time, tasty meals and cozy, warm accommodations.

If just the particular information you are seeking isn't available in this booklet, the Boston and Maine Railroad's Passenger Traffic Department will be glad to furnish it. A postcard, a letter or a telephone call to the North Station will secure the information for you and, perchance you live out of town, just ask your nearest Boston and Maine Railroad agent. If he hasn't the particular information available, he'll get it for you quickly.

This year, as usual, there will be the regular one-day Sunday "Snow Train" from Boston every Sunday and, on some Sundays from Worcester and Springfield. All these trips will be advertised in the Boston newspapers on the preceding Friday. In addition, on Saturday nights, in his regular weather forecast from Radio Station WEEI, at 11 p. m., Mr. E. B. Rideout, foremost meteorologist, will tell the "Snow Train" fans what they may expect for weather on Sunday. Mr. Rideout has become a part of the "Snow Train" institution and his forecasts are known far and wide as the "real dope" for Sunday fun.

The photographs in this year's "Snow Train Booklet" were all made last season on "Snow Train" trips by Stanley Bauman of Brockton, the official photographer of the "Snow Train". They were selected at random from the snaps of thousands of folks who had fun on "Snow Trains" last year.

There's fun for YOU on this year's trains. We urge you to look over all the trips which are offered. We urge you to peruse the lists of hotels, inns and boarding houses, if you are seeking the best in accommodations. And, we can assure you that the sports equipment establishments listed in these pages are equipped and ready, through eight years of actual experience with the "Snow Train" fans and all winter sports enthusiasts to give you the best advice and the best in equipment at reasonable prices and with the assurance that what they sell you will be what you need.

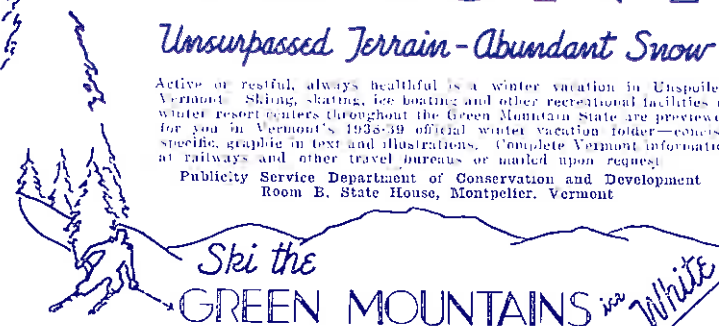

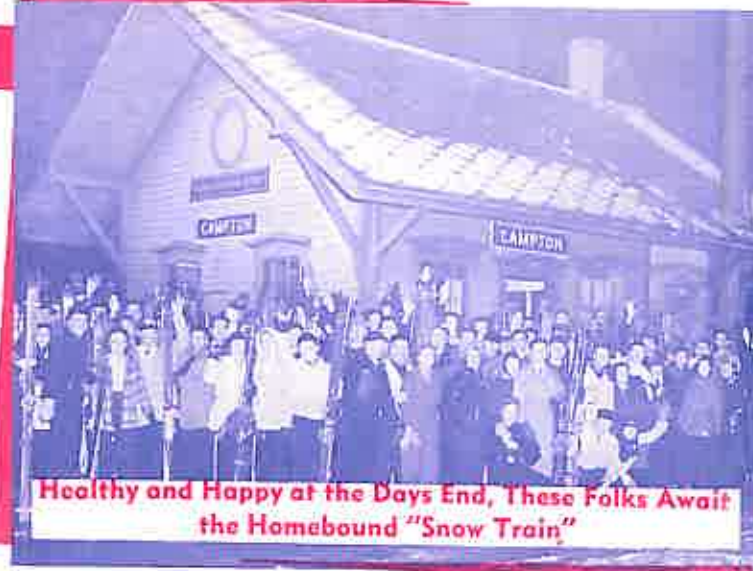
